and awareness in order to be able to provide comprehensive care based on current science as an expert and professional. Therefore, access to reliable, concise, and up-to-date resources is of utmost importance for these specialists. Palliative care services, along with the concepts of health promotion, prevention, treatment, and rehabilitation, are considered the fifth axis in accessing universal health coverage and therefore, in order to ensure equitable access of people to timely, affordable, and high-quality services, the development of these services is considered a necessity. The efforts made in the past decade in this area, while raising awareness among health service providers and the community about the necessity of these services, have also explained the importance of the issue to policymakers such that significant progress in various areas of palliative care services in the country is observed in the World Health Organization's 2025 report. However, this area of care still requires additional efforts and addressing various and sometimes neglected dimensions of palliative care, one of which seems to be end-of-life care and hospice services, which, for various reasons, especially social and cultural challenges, has not grown at a pace commensurate with other dimensions. This is despite the fact that today the concept of good death has become one of the most important keywords in this category and therefore, addressing it is recommended to pay as much attention to quality of life. It is hoped that writing this book will take a small step towards improving the health of the elderly and the quality of palliative care.
